1 Corinthians 5:7 (KJV) — 7 Purge out therefore the old leaven, that ye may be a new lump, as ye are unleavened. For even Christ our passover is sacrificed for us:

1 John 2:1, 2 (KJV) — 1 My little children, these things write I unto you, that ye sin not. And if any man sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous: 2 And he is the propitiation for our sins: and not for ours only, but also for the sins of the whole world.

The Greek word for complete is again from πληρόω (plēroō) meaning to be full and the word we translate perfect from is $\tau \dot{\epsilon} \lambda \epsilon \iota o \varsigma$ (teleios) and while in Hebrews 5:14 it is translated of full age it certainly has the main meaning of unblemished or perfect. The LXX uses teleios in texts such as:

Psalm 139:22 (KJV) — 22 I hate them with perfect [teleios in LXX] hatred: I count them mine enemies.

Song of Solomon 6:9 (KJV) — 9 My dove, my undefiled [teleios in LXX] is but one; . . .

Ephesians 5:18 (KJV) — 18 And be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess; but be filled with the Spirit;

Acts 2:4 (KJV) — 4 And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance.

Christ is the greatest Teacher that the world has ever known. And what is the standard that He holds before all who believe in Him? "Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect." Matthew 5:48. As God is perfect in His sphere, so man may be perfect in his sphere. (Testimonies for the Church, vol. 8, p. 64.1)

The ideal of Christian character is Christlikeness. There is opened before us a path of constant advancement. We have an object to gain, a standard to reach, that includes everything good and pure and noble and elevated. There should be continual striving and constant progress onward and upward toward perfection of character. (Testimonies for the Church, vol. 8, p. 64.2)




