

Notes

- THE counsel given the king by Daniel was clearly the counsel of God, for in another scripture the Lord gives the same counsel when He says, "Cease to do evil; learn to do well; seek judgment, relieve the oppressed, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow." Isa. 1:16, 17. The same thought is also expressed in James 1:27. We are enabled to break off our sins by securing the righteousness of God by faith. Rom. 3:21, 22, 25.
- IT is generally agreed among Bible scholars that a "time" in the book of Daniel and in the Revelation means a year. Josephus says that the seven "times" were seven years, and it will be noticed that the same expression, "seven times," is used by the Lord when He tells Nebuchadnezzar plainly and in literal terms what his experience will be. (See verses 29-33.)
- THE chastening of the Lord in Nebuchadnezzar's case proved of great value to him. So far as the Scripture record is concerned it indicates that he proved loyal to God ever after. 8




In this palace [the new North Palace] he had high stone terraces built that gave the appearance of being mountains planted with all kinds of trees. He had constructed and prepared what are called the Hanging Gardens for his wife, who had a love of the mountains since she had grown up in Media. 


The Hanging Gardens were built as a roughly semicircular theatre-shaped multi-tiered artificial hill some 25 metres high [82 feet]. At its base was a large pool fed by small streams of water flowing down its sides. Trees and flowers were planted in small artificial fields constructed on top of roofed colonnades. The entire garden was around 120 metres [410 feet] across and it's estimated that it was irrigated with at least 35,000 litres of water [9,246 gallons] brought by a canal and aqueduct system from up to 50 miles away. Within the garden itself water was raised mechanically by large water-raising bronze screw-pumps. (David Keys, "The biggest wonder about the Hanging Gardens of Babylon? 


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







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














The instant that the words were uttered, the sentence of judgment was pronounced. The king's reason was taken away. The judgment that he had thought so perfect, the wisdom that he had prided himself on possessing, were removed. The jewel of the mind, that which elevates man above the beasts, he no longer retained. (87 126.4)

The mighty ruler is a maniac. He now herds with the cattle to eat as they eat. He is a companion of the beasts of the field. The brow that once wore a coronet is disfigured by the absence of reason and intellect. (8T 127.1)

In Daniel's life, the desire to glorify God was the most powerful of all motives. He realized that when standing in the presence of men of influence, a failure to acknowledge God as the source of his wisdom would have made him an unfaithful steward. And his constant recognition of the God of heaven before kings, princes, and statesmen, detracted not one iota from his influence. King Nebuchadnezzar, before whom Daniel so often honored the name of God, was finally thoroughly converted, and learned to "praise and extol and honour the King of heaven" (The *Review and Herald*, January 11, 1906). (4BC 1170.5)

But when men will not consent to walk in the counsel of God, their wisdom is removed from them. They become incapable of knowing God and Jesus Christ whom He hath sent.—Letter 35, 1900. (*PM* 134.3)

When men gain success in the work of the Lord, it is because God has given them this success, not for their own glory, but for God's glory. He who seeks to steal a ray of light from the glory of the Lord will find that he will be punished for his presumption. (*PM* 139.4)
