



Health: the state of being free from illness or  
injury: he was restored to health | [as modifier] : a  
health risk.

a person's mental or physical condition: bad  
health forced him to retire | a standard for  
measuring the financial health of a company  
figurative.

origin: Old English hǣlth, of Germanic origin;  
related to whole.

Genesis 43:28 (KJV) — 28 And they answered,  
Thy servant our father is in good health (*shalom*),  
he is yet alive. And they bowed down their heads,  
and made obeisance.

Psalm 42:11 (KJV) — 11 Why art thou cast down,  
O my soul? and why art thou disquieted within  
me? hope thou in God: for I shall yet praise him,  
who is the health (yeshuah) of my countenance,  
and my God.

Acts 27:34 (KJV) — 34 Wherefore I pray you to  
take some meat: for this is for your health  
(*sōtēria*): for there shall not an hair fall from the  
head of any of you.

3 John 2 (KJV) — 2 Beloved, I wish above all things that thou mayest prosper and be in health (*hugiainō*), even as thy soul prospereth.

**REFORM = make changes in something,  
(typically a social, political, or economic  
institution or practice) in order to improve it:  
bring about a change in (someone) so that  
they no longer behave in an immoral, criminal,  
or self-destructive manner:**

Often health reform is made *health deform* by the unpalatable preparation of food. The lack of knowledge regarding healthful cookery must be remedied before health reform is a success. MM 270.1
